# FAREWELL TO STEPHEN GREEN

It is with a very heavy heart that we say farewell and wish Stephen a very happy retirement. Steve joined the school in 1998 and has been nothing but a complete revelation. The original Eco Warrior has transformed the school into one of the top trailblazing eco schools in the country which has recently been invited to join the National Eco Schools of Fame!

When Stephen was asked if he would start an Eco Club, Stephen replied that he didn't want to have a group of geeky kids meeting in a science lab but wanted to start a movement that would include and engage with students of all abilities.

That was 18 years ago and now King's Academy Ringmer is recognised as one of the leading Eco Schools in the country.

Along the way there have been awards, a visit from Royalty,



presentations in Parliament, new head teachers and hundreds of students as well as new boilers, solar panels, a wind turbine, ground source heat pumps, a car charger point and a comprehensive insulation scheme.

The school has reduced its waste by 40%, saves 400 tonnes of carbon going to the atmosphere every year as well as recycling over a 100 tonnes of material but, most importantly, it gives every student the opportunity to play a part in making a difference.

Stephen says, "Our school is a microcosm of society and there are always going to be people passionate about a topic in the same way as there will be those who are opposed to it. The important thing is to appeal to the mass in the middle. That's been the success at Ringmer.

Our Eco Reps aren't seen by their peers as being odd, they're just doing something that is eminently worthwhile. I can't tell you how much fun working with so many brilliant and inspiring students I've had and I've lost count of the packets of chocolate biscuits we've eaten!"

Not only will Stephen be missed for all the amazing work he has done over the years, but he is also the nicest man you can meet and will always do whatever he can to help. Take care!



#### THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

It's been business as usual in the English department this term: our high expectations of students have been matched with an enthusiastic approach that reflects just how conscientious our students are. Thank you for continuing to encourage and support them at home.



By Christmas, Year 11 will have completed their first run-through of the English Language papers and will be continuing to work on exam technique and finetuning their skills over the next term. Alongside this, we will be revising the key texts for Literature. As a result of the changes to the exams this year, all Year 11 will now be studying 'Macbeth', 'An Inspector Calls' and the Power and Conflict Poetry.

They must continue to work independently to revise these texts: rereading them where appropriate, making flashcards, reading articles from the British Library. Please remind them of the Google Classroom 'KS4 English Revision', where they will find resources to support them.

Year 10 have now completed two assessments in English: Macbeth and Poetry. We have been thoroughly impressed with their mature attitude and approach to these tasks. We have provided each Year 10 student with a Poetry Study Guide which we know will support them if they have missed a lesson or need further help with a poem. Please



encourage them to use these at home to complement their learning in lessons, or to catch up if they are not in school. Next term we'll be starting 'The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde'.



This is not a formal session, but a quiet space with access to support from a teacher and all the online revision resources. Students can work independently on homework, revision or preparation for assessments.






Year 7 have well and truly settled in, and have enjoyed reading and studying Roald Dahl's autobiography. 'Bov'.





We have been working particularly hard on writing this term and it's clear that confidence and accuracy is improving. Please ask them about new words they are learning - the Top 10 Vocabulary - as they are beginning to use these sophisticated words with confidence.



Next term Year 7 will be studying 'Frankenstein' the play, and gothic literature.

#### **HISTORY**

Year 7 have been studying the most famous date in English history - 1066 - and finding out how and why William Duke of Normandy won the Battle of Hastings. So too have Year 11 - although they have had to write a few more essays as they are working on their GCSE!



Year 8 have also been considering our multicultural heritage with an enquiry into the different migrant groups - starting with the Celts and ending with the Windrush generation - who make up the population of the UK. They are just finishing their study of why the

#### **PSHE**

It's been a busy term in PSHE. We started the academic year by focusing on mental wellbeing. We looked at how we can look after our emotional wellbeing support others and when and where to ask for support if it's needed for ourselves or others. We explored coping strategies for looking after ourselves and developed an understanding of negative coping strategies as well as discussing how we can develop digital resilience.



Year 9 have produced some brilliant work on body confidence looking at appearance ideals and how images in the media are manipulated and present, in some circumstances, completely unrealistic expectations around appearance. We have looked at ways to banish talk about bodies and appearance, instead focusing on what makes us unique. The unit finished with students making a campaign project to promote body confidence - some students designed posters to celebrate natural beauty, some designed frames to be placed on the mirrors in the bathrooms covered in positive slogans and one student even designed a code of conduct.

English executed their King in 1649 and then invited his son back as King in 1660!



Year 9 have completed their exploration into the British Empire with a special focus on India and come to a conclusion about whether they think the British should be proud or feel guilty about our imperial past. This is particularly important as we move on to study the Great War as soldiers from all over the Empire fought and died in that conflict.

#### RE

Year 7 have been finding out about the 6 major world religions this term to see how much they already know and to make sure they have a good base of knowledge before considering different ideas in more depth.



Year 8 have been taking a closer look at Islam - what do Muslims believe (do they all believe the same things?), how do they worship Allah and how do their beliefs affect their lives?



Year 9 meanwhile have applied themselves to one of the most difficult questions - is there a God? How can you tell? What have different philosophers argued over the centuries? How does Science fit in? They have all worked really hard and definitely deserve a break!













# **ECO WARRIOR THANKS**

What a delight it was to eventually take a few students out for a school trip. On Thursday 10 December, we took our first trip of the year as a special thank you to our Eco Leaders for all their hard work and achievements. Three year 11s spent the morning at the Rampion Visitor Centre in Brighton, learning everything there is to know about renewable energy, being carbon-free and the greenhouse effect. They especially loved the virtual reality headsets that take you out to the wind turbines, board them and take you up to the top. They were amazingly realistic.





The Rampion off-shore wind farm has 116 wind turbines that powers 350,000 homes every day. An interesting fact is that just one turn/sweep from one of the turbine sails generates enough energy to power a kettle for 2 hours! A great experience was had by all, including our naughty Elf who tagged along for the day. The Rampion VC is free to the public and has so much to see and do including a huge interactive globe full of amazing facts about the planet. true honour for anyone...a congratulations and thank you letter from the greatest Environmentalist the world has ever seen. Sir David Attenbough!!




We are very pleased Sarah Pillar from our Geography Department and Emma Holmes Learning Support have both been appointed to keep

#### SAFEGUARDING FOCUS

TikTok Update Parental Controls with Family Pairing Feature (SWGfL)

TikTok is used by many teenagers and sometimes children younger than that 13 despite its terms and conditions. Using the new Family Pairing feature can allow parents to guide their child's TikTok experience in a safer way. Features include:

Search: Decide what can be searched for. This includes content, users, hashtags, or sounds

Screen Time Management: Sets how long your teen can spend on TikTok each day

Discoverability: Decide on the account being private (you decide who can see their content) or public



(anyone can search and view content)

#### MUSIC DEPARTMENT

This term has seen real changes for the Music Department here at King's Academy Ringmer as - owing to our bubble system - only certain year groups have been using the music rooms. Our students have adapted brilliantly to the new systems and there are so many things taking place that we will aim to recreate in the future once we resume our lessons in the usual way.

Year 7 have been watching performances by Stomp and learning body percussion routines as well as learning how to (and developing their skills) in reading and writing rhythmic notation. This is something that is required on the GCSE course and so this skill will equip any students that decide this is something for them in the future. They have been really enthused to know that a lot of what they are learning, our Year 10 students are also working on!


One of the most entertaining discoveries of this term has been the boomwhackers and the many ways they can be put to good use with students across the year groups. Usually in Year 7 we'd be learning to play Seven Nation Army on keyboards and guitars, but this term they managed enthusiastic boom-whacking instead!



Year 8 have been working incredibly well on Chromebooks in their classrooms and we've worked on two projects, most recently The Blues, which has included the students improvising on Chrome Music Lab over a blues backing which has been incredibly effective. Here is an example from Isaac in Year 8.

Year 9 have also been working with real focus on Chromebooks in their classrooms on a project all about Music for Film. They have been watching clips of films, learning about music within films, as well as themes and leitmotifs and the way music can really make or break a film. They have recently started composing their own scores for film clips which we will have ready to share in the new year.

Our lovely GCSE students have made a great start to the year in spite of the difficulties of not seeing each other in the summer term. It is so lovely to have them back and hear them all making music.



We are so pleased to be able to release our second set of virtual performances - 35 students across all year groups have volunteered to take part and made recordings of performances for us to include. This is an incredible response from our students and it is so inspiring to see how many Year 7 students have wanted to participate. We can't wait to get back to some kind of regular performing in groups and are working out the safest way that we can make this happen at some point in 2021. We have dedicated our concert to Steve Green as our way of saying thank you for everything he has done to help and support the music department over the past years (especially since 2018 when I took over the department). His tireless efforts and unfailing sense of humour plus his utter joy in music has always been hugely appreciated and uplifting, especially in the run up to concerts and shows when the nerves are really beginning to show! # **SCIENCE**

Science has had a very successful first term back!

Despite the challenging times, science practicals have continued to operate in a close to normal way and students have had lessons in laboratories within their oubbles. Big thank you to our amazing science teachers and technicians who have made this possible!

Year 7

In biology, students studied how the body moves using the skeleton, joints and muscles. In chemistry, they learnt about the particle model and how it can be used to explain states of matter, changes in state and diffusion. In physics, students learnt about forces and the effects they can have on the motion of objects. During these topics, students completed a variety of practical investigations. Through these investigations, students' have started to develop an understanding of the scientific process and the skills required to work safely in the laboratory. the skills required to work safely in the laboratory.

Year 8

In biology, students studied human reproduction and the changes that happen during adolescence. In chemistry, they learnt about how metals and non-metals react with water, oxygen and acids. In physics, students learnt about sound ways a hearing light ways and sight about sound waves, hearing, light waves and sight.
During these topics, students completed a variety of practical investigations. Through these investigations, students' have developed a strong understanding of the scientific process, with a specific focus on methodology.

Year 9

In biology, students learnt about evolution through natural selection and how genetic information is inherited.

In chemistry, they learnt about how humans are changing the environment by causing the enhanced greenhouse effect and depletion of Earth's resources. In physics, students learnt about waves effects waves and how they can be modelled. During these topics, students completed a variety of practical investigations. Through these investigations, students' have developed a strong understanding of the scientific process, with a specific focus on variables. focus on variables.

Year 10 and 11

Students are making brilliant progress with their teachers preparing from the GCSE curriculum. Year 10 are working on paper 1 content in biology, chemistry and physics. Year 11 are working on paper 2 content in biology, chemistry and physics, and recapping their knowledge of paper 1.

We have also successfully launched Tassomai, a state-of-the-art learning platform, to support students in revising for their GCSE examinations and accelerate

their progress.

### **YEAR 11 REVISION EVENING**

Every year we host a Year 11 revision evening and this year in true Covid style we hosted the event online. The event went well, but obviously we need to keep on top of things and students as ever will need to be organised and dedicated. ### **OLLIE'S FUTURE IN 'GOOD HANDS'**

King's Academy Ringmer Year 11 star rugby player Ollie Wigman has got himself onto the Gordons/Harlequins Diploma in Sporting Excellence (DiSE) programme.

In September 2021, Ollie will enter Gordons School as a full time boarding pupil under the Harlequins RFC DiSE programme whilst studying A-level PE and two other subjects. This is a huge honour as there are only eight places available for the whole of Sussex/Surrey/South London. Clearly, Gordons school and Harlequins see his potential and think he could be good enough to be given a professional contract at eighteen.

Alongside this fantastic opportunity, Ollie will be attending Harlequins Professional Training Centre at Surrey Sports Park each Sunday for a full day from December 2020 as he moves from the Developing Player Programme (DPP) into the Elite Players Development Group (EPDG).



Ollie was eight years old when he first had an interest in rugby, but it wasn't until he was 11 and the 2015 Rugby World Cup when he really got hooked. Ollie's Dad had played rugby at various levels and his passion and enthusiasm for the sport thankfully rubbed off on Ollie! Ollie said, "he has shown me that anything is possible if you try hard enough. He has always been there for me and my brothers during the good and bad times, bringing us up for the majority of our childhood on his own. My dad is my biggest critic and without him I wouldn't be where I am now."

Ollie first started playing rugby for Eastbourne RFC, training twice a week for two hours, but his hunger to learn more and improve his skill set led him to join an additional older group for extra training with the colts.



Whilst playing at Eastbourne, Ollie was invited to trial for the Harlequins and was successful. He now trains for two hours a week with the Harlequins on top of his training for his new club, Heathfield RFC.

Playing rugby professionally is Ollie's biggest aspiration, hopefully by the age of eighteen and hopefully for Harlequins. The ultimate goal would be to be capped for England and then to be selected to play for the British and Irish Lions.

Since realising his potential both on and off the rugby field, Ollie's work ethic has changed dramatically; he undertakes strength and conditioning training sessions three mornings a week before coming to school, trains on the rugby pitches several times a week with his age group and the older colts section, and completes a long distance run on the nights that he doesn't have club training. This dedication has seen an improvement at school in his learning and attitude, as well as losing a vast amount of weight, dropping from 120kg to 95kg.



I asked Ollie about his thoughts on being selected for both Gordons School and the Harlequins Academy and he said, "Having just started in the academy on the EPDG was an amazing feeling, stepping into the Harlequins Training Centre where many of my rugby heroes train daily, like Joe Marler, Marcus Smith, Mike Brown and Danny Care. All professional rugby players and all capped playing for England which is truly unbelievable.

The real work doesn't begin until next September when I start at Gordons School boarding fulltime. I will be training between 12 and 18 hours a week and also playing rugby matches in the top UK schools U18 rugby league, playing against teams from the likes of Exeter, Saracens and Wasps and I can't wait!"
