

LILAC SKY COUNSELLING SERVICE

Hello, my name is Lauren. I am a qualified and registered Counsellor. I am a registered member of the British Association of Counsellors and Psychotherapists (BACP) and abide by their ethical framework and competences.

I offer face to face sessions in a safe and comfortable room at school where young people can talk to me and discuss their thoughts and feelings without fear of judgement. I offer a low-cost counselling service at £40 per 50-minute session. I take referrals from the young person's parents/primary carer/guardians and I recommend a block of 6 sessions which can be extended to 8 or 10 sessions when reviewed and where it is needed. I offer sessions every Wednesday during term time throughout the school day and I also hold sessions before and after school. RINGMER ECO HUB

This term our Eco efforts have included:

 Clearing the raised beds ready for planting in the spring with the help of charity 'A Band of Brothers'. We hope to fill the beds with lots of pollinating plants and a herb garden for use in Food Tech.



- Going Green for <u>Just One Tree Day</u>.
 Students paid a pound to wear a green item of clothing and to date have raised £180 to fund afforestation of threatened woodland around the world.
- Hosting sustainable energy company OVESCO as they shared their plans for a solar farm in Ringmer. Students were able to see the proposed plans and pose questions to the engineers in an information evening and lunchtime visit.
- Planting native trees including hazel, hawthorn and dog roses donated by the Woodland Trust and The Tree Council to



create a hedgerow on the perimeter of our Eco Hub land. Hedgerows provide food and shelter for many species and act as corridors for smaller prey species to travel safely.

 Taking part in <u>Switch Off Fortnight</u>, a national energy-saving campaign from 'The Pod'. Our Eco Reps spent the fortnight raising awareness about how to reduce our electricity use in school including turning off lights, turning off monitors and projectors when not in use.

Undertaking a Surfers Against Sewage Plastic Survey. Eco Reps spent lunchtime collecting plastic bottles and other single use plastics. In our Eco Rep meetings we have spent time discussing how we might reduce the amount of plastic used in school and raise awareness about renewable resource use.

The National Sleep Helpline helps anyone with sleep issues including adults, parents and young people. The helpline is available from 7pm and 9pm, Sunday to Thursday on 03303 530 541.

Poor sleep can affect anyone and it can be a major stress for parents whose own sleep can be impaired by their children's difficulties getting to sleep, staying asleep or staying in their own bed, leading to greater stress.

Having a sleep issue is surprisingly common. At any given time this affects up to 40% of adults and 50% of children (this rises to 80% with a SEND diagnosis). These problems are typically persistent and do not resolve themselves without intervention.

Families often don't know where to seek help and yet issues can often be nipped in the bud with basic and accessible interventions.

The Maths department initiated the KS3 boardgames club this year. Attendance could be better but we have a dedicated few that attend every Monday lunchtime.


My favourite games are definitely Genius Square and Genius Star. They are problem solving puzzles like Tetris that requires speed

Beat Goes on Workshop - Year 8 At the end of September, we held our re-scheduled Body Percussion workshops, which had been planned for our Year 7 in July 2021. As part of our catch-up curriculum we welcomed Ollie Tunmer to the school to work with our current year 8 (last year's Year 7) on performing with body percussion, creating their own music and learning to play as a group. Ollie is a phenomenal musician and trainer: he has worked with Stomp and The Lost and Found Orchestra and a few years ago, he set up his own company Beat Goes On. He has been on The One Show and recently performed alongside Owain Wyn Evans among a troupe of 50 drummers in his record breaking 24 hour mathon for Children in Need.

Ollie's work with Year 8 was such a huge success that we have already invited him back in to work with our current Year 7 on a larger scale performance.

Glyndebourne Trip - Fidelio

Just before half term, Mr Peacock and Ms Urquhart took 15 students from Year 9 and 11 to Glyndebourne Opera House to see a performance of Beethoven's Fidelio. The students were incredible ambassadors for the school and watched and listened with such incredible attention. They were also so open-minded about the whole experience, which was really inspiring to see. It was a very moving occasion to see such a high profile venue full of young people, being transported by music which is hundreds of years old. They were really interesting to talk to about the whole occasion, both the opera and the whole experience itself, and had really



interesting opinions about how relevant and important opera could be today. We were very lucky to see this particular production as the company realised during the week of performances that the set was too large to tour, so we were some of the very lucky few that will see this version.

Piano Man Masterclass - In November, six of our fantastic piano players from Year 7, 8 and 9 were joined via video link by Richard Meyrick. This was a free masterclass in which students performed a piece and Richard gave feedback on their playing. This was both an extremely exciting opportunity, but also one that requires real resilience as students have to try and improve their work on the spot. They also have to then try and perform the music straight away with the new changes, instead of having time to go away and practice as they might with a usual lesson. SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Science has had a very successful term 1 and 2. The biggest change this term has been the launch of the Tassomai learning platform for all students. Tassomai is an



intelligent online learning program helping students at all levels achieve outstanding results. Content is broken down into bite sized chunks and tailored to each user, its intelligent algorithm works out what students know and where they need to focus their efforts. Learn more here.

Congratulations to our students who have correctly answered a combined total of over 250,000 questions. In particular, a huge congratulations to Tristan H (Y9) and Teigan P (Y10) who have completed the highest number of questions with accuracy above 70%. Tristan and Tegian answered 4127 questions and 5958 questions respectively!

The top students from each year will be entered into a prize drawn for an Amazon gift card to reward their commitment to independent learning. Winners will be announced during the end of term assemblies.

Year 7

In biology, students studied how the body moves using the skeleton, joints and muscles. In chemistry, they learnt about the particle model and how it can be used to explain states of matter, changes in state and diffusion.

In physics, students learnt about forces and the effects they can have on the motion of objects. During these topics, students completed a variety of practical investigations. Through these investigations, students' have started to develop an understanding of the scientific process and the skills required to work safely in the laboratory.

Year 8

In biology, students studied human reproduction and the changes that happen during adolescence. In chemistry, they learnt about how metals and non-metals react with water, oxygen and acids. In physics, students learnt about sound waves, hearing, light waves and sight. During these topics, students completed a variety of practical investigations. Through these investigations, students' have developed a strong understanding of the scientific process, with a specific focus on methodology.

Year 9

In biology, students learnt about evolution through natural selection and how genetic information is inherited. In chemistry, they learnt about how humans are changing the environment by causing the enhanced greenhouse effect and depletion of Earth's resources. In physics, students learnt about waves effects waves and how they can be modelled. During these topics, students completed a variety of practical investigations. Through these investigations, students' have developed a strong understanding of the scientific process, with a specific focus on variables.

Year 10 and 11

Students are making brilliant progress with their teachers preparing from the GCSE curriculum. Year 10 are working on paper 1 content in biology, chemistry and physics. Year 11 are working on paper 2 content in biology, chemistry and physics, and recapping their knowledge of paper 1.

MATHEMATICS

As we came back stronger than ever before in September with a full department, yet further strengthened by the addition of our latest recruit, Vice-Principal Mr. Burchett! Numbers at King's Academy Ringmer continue to grow and so must we as a Maths department, now back up to five sets in both year 7 and year 8 and looking set to continue this trend with the new cohort in September 2022.

In the lower school, we have dedicated lots of time and effort to maximize the students' mathematical fluency with fractions, decimals, and percentages. These are the foundation skills that allow a seamless transition to many more aspects of mathematics as students travel on their mathematical journey.

Following on from all the number work, we will be looking at various mathematical constructions across all year groups in 2022. Such constructions will include, accurate scale drawings of shapes, bisectors of both lines and angles, and loci from points and edges. As such, please can I ask that you ensure your child is equipped for all maths lessons with the following equipment. Please do get in touch with your teacher if there is a problem with any of this equipment.

- Casio scientific calculator (you can search around and get better prices than the £14.99 RRP)
- Pens and pencils
- Maths set with compass (and short pencil), protractor, and ruler

At the moment, we are targeting our **year 11** cohort towards the first set of summer exams since 2019 and as always feel confident in AQA to deliver a fair set of exams for both our foundation and higher GCSE students. As always we act upon the two sets of mock exams completed at the end of year ten and again in the autumn term. Using a question level analysis proforma we are able to teach the specific topics that our children have found difficult. As class teachers, we then intersperse these extra topics alongside our standard schemes of work. If your child has anything in the GCSE specification that they wish to be covered, please make sure they speak to their maths teacher and we will be sure to include this in our lessons.

Advice as always for our **year 11** (this would also be beneficial for those in **year 10**) is that it is never too late to start practicing! We are all studying AQA 8300 GCSE Mathematics, so students can begin attempting past paper questions at home which are all publicly available online. Corbett Maths do their "5-aday" questions which are there for every day of the year and these are a really quick way of practicing maths at home. Here is the foundation and higher plus (for those who really want a challenge) from Christmas Day!

One approach with maths revision is to alternate your past papers - do one open book and search for answers every time you get stuck, then make a list of these topics to practice or speak to your teacher about. For the next paper, do it under exam conditions and use the mark scheme to see how you are doing and what grade you would get.

For the other years, 2022 will see the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge underway in April for years seven and eight, whilst those in years nine, ten, and eleven will have the opportunity to sit the Intermediate Maths Challenge in February. Past questions for both can be found here for the junior and here for the intermediate

FOOD TECHNOLOGY

This term we have had a busy time in the Food room with all years involved in a variety of practical work over the Autumn terms.

Year 7 have had their first experience of cooking at school, getting involved with soup making, bread, fruit crumble and a selection of different carbohydrate based salads. Many new students also signed up to our after school cookery club and along with year 8 club members have served up a range of sweet baked goods including fruit muffins, gingerbread and chocolate brownies.

The school open evening gave keen cooks a chance to show off their baking abilities once again and we were able to offer potential new students the opportunity to try our school baked



chocolate chip cookies and lemon drizzle cake.

Meanwhile year 9 students have been investigating different methods of food produc-

tion in the UK, including eggs, vegetables and wheat flour. Their cookery repertoire includes omelettes, pasties, muffins and marinating meat for their own recipe stir fries.

GCSE year 10 students can now advise on following a nutritionally balanced diet suited to an individual's age and lifestyle as well



as beginning to produce more complex dishes combining newly learnt practical skills. They will be in a good position to work on the project based section of their GCSE next year which is currently occupying our **year 11s**. These students are currently preparing for their 3 hour practical cooking exam, planned for next Spring - a chance to showcase their own particular signature dishes.

Mrs Budd Food Tech

RE

Year 7 students have been investigating the main ideas and practices of 6 world religions this term - Christianity, Buddhism, Sikhism, Islam, Judaism and Hinduism. They have been getting to grips with ideas of monotheism versus polytheism and proving that they can identify features of each religion.

Year 8 meanwhile have looked more in depth at one particular religion - Islam. They have considered not only the practices of the faith but the reasons behind these practices and how this affects the everyday lives of its followers. At present they are considering the spiritual and emotional rewards of making a Hajj for a practising Muslim.

Year 9 students however, are tackling perhaps the fundamental question of human existence does God exist? They have studied a number of philosophical arguments for and against the existence of God (from the teleological/design argument espoused by theists to the problem of evil put forward by atheists) and are trying to come up with their own personal definition of the divine. Quite impressive really!

PSHE

Year 9 students attended a performance in November of 'County Lines' - a theatre performance showing the reality of young peoples' involvement with drug dealing which was organised with the help of East Sussex PSHE Hub, working with public health and the Standards & Learning Effectiveness Service Their follow-up PSHE lessons gave an opportunity for young people to explore the broader context of exploitation with specific reference to county lines.

HISTORY DEPT

Having sat their trial exams in October (very successfully for the most part) **Year 11** History students have been getting to grips with the reasons for and consequences of the Norman invasion of England in 1066. It's all got a bit 'Game of Thrones' at times as we learnt about the power of the House of Godwin, or the Harrying of the North in 1069 where according to Orderic Vitalis '100.00 Christians' were murdered or starved to death by William I in revenge for a rebellion. There are pleasing links with the REAL Macbeth of Scotland (not Shakespeare's) to compare to GCSE English.

Year 10 meanwhile have been considering medical progress during the Middle Ages and the Renaissance (spoiler alert - not much). We have analysed how much changed between the Black Death of 1348 and the Great Plague of 1665 and considered whether there any analogies to be drawn with the 21st century's response to a pandemic.

KS3 History students are also considering how the past shapes our world today.

Year 9 have looked at how the British Empire developed in the 18th and 19th centuries, with a special emphasis on India, and are now examining how imperialism contributed to the start of the Great War in 1914 as well as the role played by soldiers from the Empire (a third of the 'British' Army was from India, for example).

Year 8 have studied some of the groups of people who have migrated to Britain over the years (from the Celts to people from the West Indies) and how they have been treated when they get here. They are now considering how democracy very slowly began to develop as a result of the English Revolution of the 1640s.

Year 7 are beginning their investigation of the roots of democracy by starting with it's opposite - the feudal system set up by William the Conqueror where he owned all the land and had all the power. One of his main strategies to stop the Anglo-Saxons rebelling was to build castles and Year 7 will be creating their own models or diagrams over the Christmas break!

NHS CADETS

What is NHS Cadets?

NHS Cadets is a new scheme created by St John Ambulance in partnership with the NHS, providing opportunities to explore skills, knowledge and volunteering roles within healthcare. It is aimed at young people aged 14 to 18 who are from communities currently under-represented within the NHS and St John Ambulance.

The programme offers young people health awareness sessions, courses to develop their leadership and communication skills and an insight or experience in volunteering within the NHS. It is a free programme, consisting of weekly, 2-hour sessions for 11 months. Cadets will be supported throughout their volunteering journey by our NHS Cadets Team.

Who can get involved?

The initiative is seeking young people who

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might not have previously considered volunteering in healthcare. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Young people living with learning difficulties and / or disabilities
- Young people in the care system, or recent care leavers
- Refugees or Asylum Seekers
- Young Carers
- Homeless young people
- Those not in education, employment or training, or those with school results lower than you hoped/need
- Those living with mental health concerns (same principle as anyone with a learning difficulty or disability)
- Those who identify as being part of the LGBTQI+ community
- Those coming from low-income families / young people in receipt of free school meals
- Young people from ethnic minority communities


have been working on graphics with Mr Potter. Classes will move around in January so that by the end of the year all students will have experienced all three areas.

Year 8 have been working in a similar manner with some students working on the chocolate bar project, designing a new and exciting product along with its packaging and a mould to form it in. Other classes have been working on the lantern project where they have to work collaboratively to batch produce the structure to hold the shades they have made individually. While some have been studying further Food & Nutrition.

Alessi has been the theme for **Year 9** so far this year. Students have looked at the history of the Alessi company including its successful products and sometimes not so successful ones! They have then designed and modelled their own Alessi style novelty egg cup before



going on to form their final design in clay. One of our more messy projects, but probably one of our more fun ones too. A new project has been introduced in **Year 10** this year thanks to Mr Smith - our very talented DT technician. The project has been designed to support the theory of timbers and involves students making a small wooden stool. This probably sounds simple enough, but it supports a huge amount of learning. We look at natural and manufactured timbers and how they behave, tools and processes, health and safety, fixtures & fittings and surface finishing to name but a few areas. I think it's fair to say that all **Y10** students have found this an enjoyable product and all have produced an item that they can be proud of now and in the future when they look back.



Year 11 have been busy with their GCSE NEA task. The NEA (non examined assessment) is the work that students carry out in school which makes up half of their final GCSE grade, so it's important that they get it right! It involves them designing and making a product from scratch based on a theme they choose set by the exam board. We have various projects in the pipeline based on keeping fit and active, outdoor living and preparing for emergencies. Students have interpreted these themes in a wide variety of ways leading to designs ranging from dumb bells to bird boxes and everything else in between! Students have just finished modelling their designs and will be moving on to create their final items in January. There will be some very novel interpretations with the final results which is exactly what we want - creative, independent, inspirational designers!


