We use quite a few online learning platforms as you can see from the links at the bottom of the page, such as GCSE Pod, Seneca etc. We have added a user guide to the school website **@Home** page in case students or parents need any help. You can also find the two previous **@Home** Newsletters and refer to **@Home** 1 to remind yourself of the timetable we suggested as a guide to help structure your day (clearer version).

11.10 - 12.00	Lesson time	Google Classroom or work packs
12.00 - 12.50	Lesson time	Google Classroom or work packs
12.50-1.35	Lunch	Eat a nutritious lunch - chat with family and siblings and get in touch with friends
1.35 - 2.25	Creative time	Draw, bake, play an instrument, do some creative writing, do some art, puzzles etc
2.25 - 3.15	Lesson time	Google Classroom or work packs
3.15 - 3.45	Reading	Read a book of your choice
3.45 - 4.15	Chores	Help around the house - tidy up, prep dinner, do the laundry, tidy your room
4.15 - 5.15	Fresh air	Try to get outside if you can - walk, cycle, jog - but remember to follow social distancing rules

structure of the school day at home.

How should I structure my child's day?

This is largely up to you and will depend on your family circumstances. For example, as a family you may have to share IT facilities and therefore it wouldn't be fair for us to insist on a rigid structure. We share a suggested timetable for the day and this aims to ensure that our students get a balanced day and take part in other healthy activities - reading, helping around the house, getting outside etc. Your child could follow their school timetable if you feel this is the best option for them.

Why do you release all of the work at the start of the day?

Originally, we released work during the timetabled lessons but parental feedback suggested this was difficult if siblings were sharing IT or parents were working remotely. Therefore, we release all work by 8.00 a.m. so that families can plan their day. People also wanted to be able to do Joe Wicks at 9 a.m.! However, students can still do their work in the order of their timetable for that day.

THE DAY HOME

'The Day' is a resource we use in school regularly. The Day is a daily online newspaper for secondary schools in the United Kingdom "which links news stories to the national curriculum and encourages pupils to debate and engage with the wider world." However, now they have launched 'The Day Home', a daily newsletter for parents and guardians designed to help enrich their children's learning with real-world knowledge and skills. Published 7am Monday to Friday and entirely free for the duration of school closures, 'The Day Home' hopes to set young people on

the path to exploring the real world and thinking for themselves. It will include:-

- A brief guide to the important news of the day.
- One live topic per day for you to debate with children.
- Links to the best journalism available anywhere in the world.
- One activity per day recommended for each of the five Key Stages.
 Suitable for children aged six to 18.

OAK NATIONAL ACADEMY

You may have seen that the Department for Education has released some online lessons through the Oak National Academy. Oak National Academy is a new collection of high-quality lessons and online resources. Backed by the Government, it has been created in response to the coronavirus lockdown.

The online classroom offers free access to great teachers, delivering video lessons, quizzes and worksheets. Available for both primary and secondary levels, it covers a range of subjects. They will provide new lessons and resources each week.

Some teachers in school may use Oak National Academy for some subjects and topics. However, some may not if it doesn't fit in with their curriculum plans

or it's a topic that has already been covered. However, we are more than happy if your child wants to explore this as a way to supplement the work they are being set by their class teachers.

ECO CORNER


Welcome to another installment of Mr Green's Eco Corner - full of environmental news.
